DISRUPTING THE STATUS QUO

Welcome Hall Mission is determined to participate in the transformation of our city. We have been serving Montréalers in need for more than 127 years. 2018 was a watershed year for us because we began to prepare and plan for the opening of our first location well outside the downtown core of the city.

Historically, most of the people experiencing poverty and homelessness could be found within a five-kilometer radius of the city's downtown core. This is not the case any longer. In 2018, we made the decision to open a new location in the northeast sector of the island of Montréal, more than 20 kilometers from the center of the city. This is something that could only be done thanks to the generosity of thousands of donors and funding partners.

Welcome Hall Mission's offer of service includes one of the largest emergency shelters for men in Canada and provides meals, beds and support to more than 225 people per night. Nonetheless, the emergency shelter is simply the doorway of entry for a variety of services that are designed to accompany these clients on a journey towards permanent housing. Homelessness is a complex phenomenon and requires a multitude of responses but chronic homelessness should not exist in the 21st century in a modern, wealthy city. We recognize that the people who come to our door have inherent dignity and value, regardless of their current circumstances. Our role is to listen to their stories so that we can assist and accompany. We do not judge or prescribe.

The past year was also characterized by continued growth in demand for healthy food at our free grocery store, Marché Bon Accueil. Our capacity has been stretched by the addition of many clients who are seeking asylum in Canada and come to us for food, free dental care at our clinic, health care referrals, and employment assistance. These new arrivals are courageous, well-educated, industrious people who have escaped challenging situations and are looking to re-establish themselves. Thanks to you, our donors, and the hard work of our incredible staff team and our volunteers we are able to help them.

I am pleased to present this annual report. A report like this contains a few numbers to provide a snapshot of what we are doing. Numbers matter, but cannot tell the complete story of changed lives. Welcome Hall Mission may serve thousands of clients each year but transformation happens one person at a time. I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to serve at the Mission and for your continued support.

BECOMING THE CHANGE

This past December, the need for emergency shelter beds far exceeded those available in Montréal. That fact, coupled with some very unfortunate events that caused a public outcry, meant that we had to act- and quick!

From January 15th to April 15th 2019, Welcome Hall Mission, in partnership with Accueil Bonneau, Maison du Père, Old Brewery Mission, the CIUSSS Center-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal and the City of Montréal, implemented an emergency overflow shelter for those experiencing homelessness, at the former Royal Victoria Hospital.

Although not a solution, the project did give some of the most reputable players in the fight against homelessness in Montréal a chance to work together on a problem that plagues the city every winter- the danger of keeping people on the streets during brutal cold snaps. The power of partnership and working together was undeniable in this case, and the project was deemed an overall success by all involved.

Over the span of 90 nights, the high-accessibility shelter hosted a total of 1585 different men and women between the ages of 18 and 85, as well as their furry friends! There were no major incidents and we were acquainted with people who we would have never otherwise had the opportunity to help. We still have much to overcome, however, these numbers allow us to better evaluate, and in turn, better serve Montréalers in need.





MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Once again this year our annual Back to School Event "Rentrée la tête haute" and our Christmas Event "Noël pour tous" were huge success'. The smiling faces of the children coupled with the relief in the eyes of their parents was quite remarkable. We are so fortunate to be able to serve such loving and devoted families.

Every week in 2017–2018, Welcome Hall Mission offered shelter to approximately 250 men every night at our Emergency Shelter for men or at a Résidence Bon Accueil.

The average duration of a stay at the shelter is 14 days, and 75% of these men are able to find housing with our support.

Through "Projet Logement Montréal", 250 people now live in stable housing since 2015, with a success rate of staying off the streets at 93%.²

Every month, 133 594 in Montréal people receive food assistance, including 26 642 children under the age of 17.3 Welcome Hall Mission offers the largest food assistance program, open to the public in the Greater Montréal Area.


